A JUST RESOLUTION?

As one of his first acts as a newly elected bishop serving the Michigan Episcopal Area, Bishop David Bard approved a "just resolution" in response to charges filed against Rev. Michael J. Tupper for officiating at a samegender wedding on July 17, 2015. This was Rev. Tupper's second time to be charged with this offense. The resolution states that the Council of Bishops' recommendation at General Conference 2016 regarding a Commission on A Way Forward "encouraged [them] 'to explore options to help the church live in grace with one another." The quote comes from a statement by the bishops that reads "We will continue to explore options to help the church live in grace with one another - including ways to avoid further complaints, trials and harm while we uphold the *Discipline* [emphasis added]." Ignoring

the second half of the statement allowed Bishop Bard to approve a resolution that calls for not only continued disobedience to the *Discipline*, but calls on the Michigan Area to act as a model for a new and inclusive UMC that allows churches to decide whether or not to accept gay clergy to lead their congregations. Instead of being held accountable for breaking his vows to uphold the *Discipline*, Rev. Tupper was tasked to "set up a training session for all Michigan clergy in the spring of 2017 to offer pastoral care for LGBTQI individuals who are considering marriage or ordained ministry." The resolution is seen by many as a rejection of the authority of General Conference.



I learned of a new day that has been added to our calendar between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day. A few years ago, "Black Friday" was added. In recent years the Tuesday after Thanksgiving has been desig-

nated as #GivingTuesday. This is a reminder to us about the importance of giving during this season of the year. Many people will make contributions to non-profit ministries, charities, and churches. Also, people are thinking in terms of an end of the year gift.
